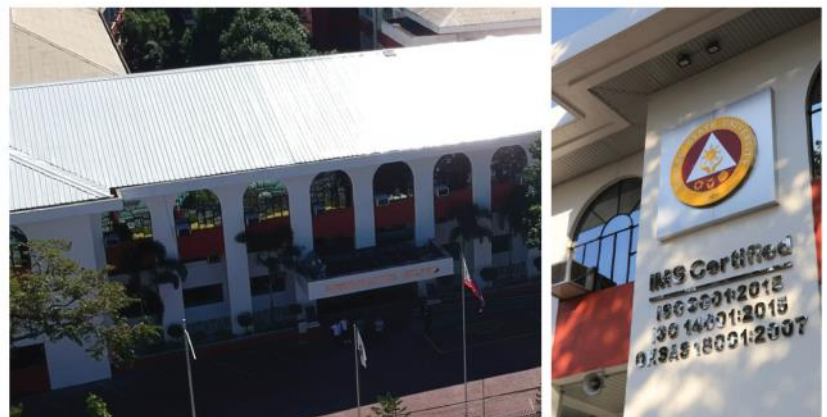

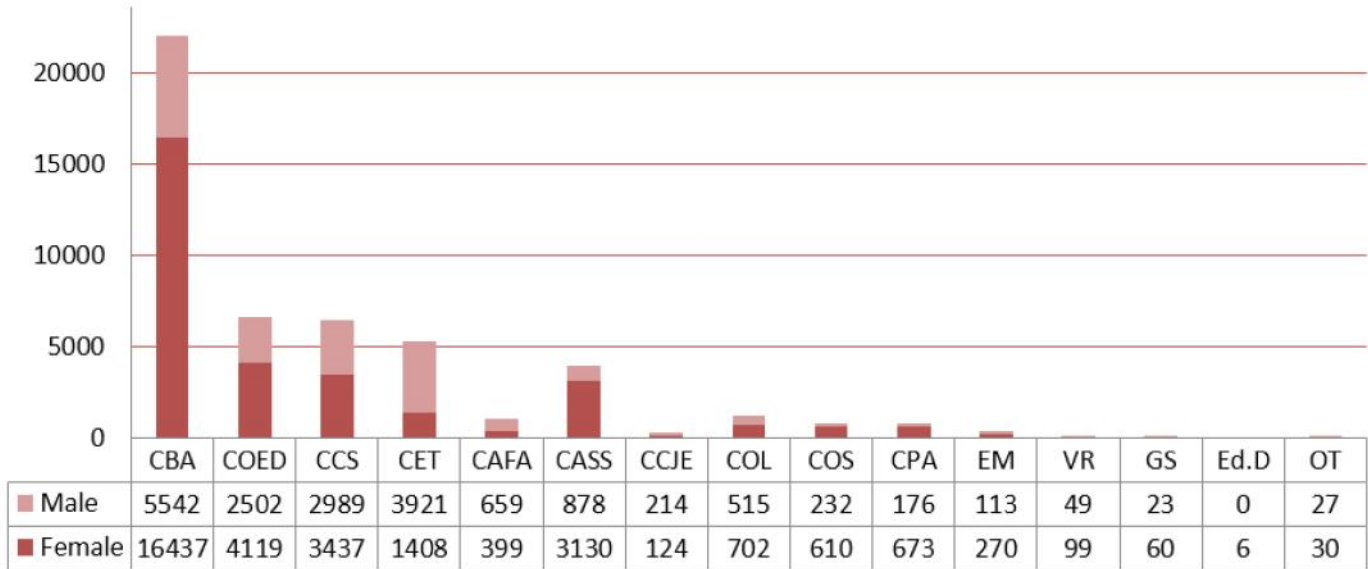

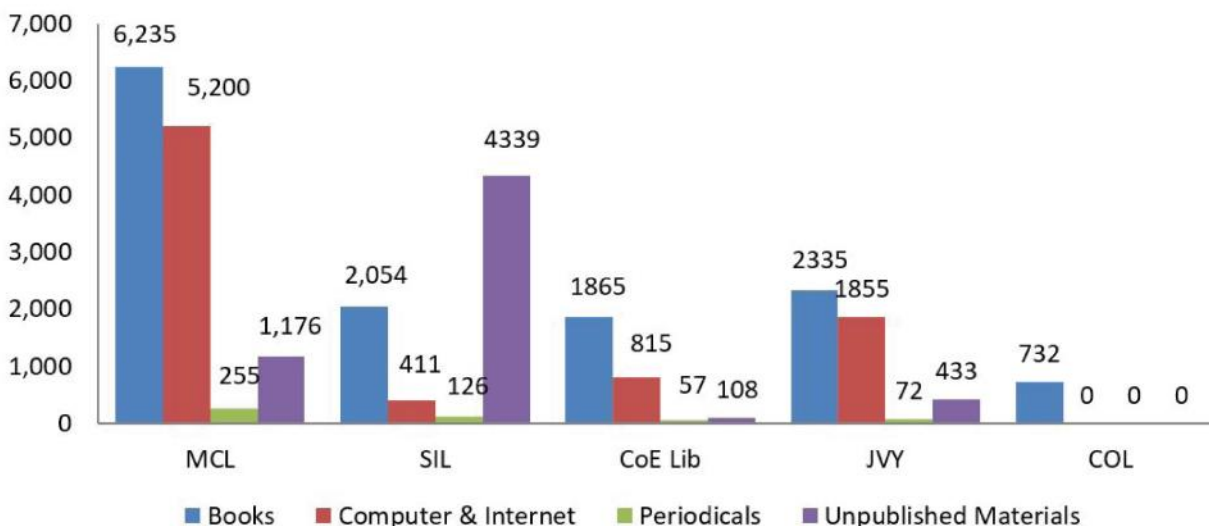

## Completed and Presented Research

The University Research Office (URO) highlights of accomplishments for 2018 involves BOR approval of the Food Technology and Research Center building, and approval of the manual of the University Research Statistical Center. 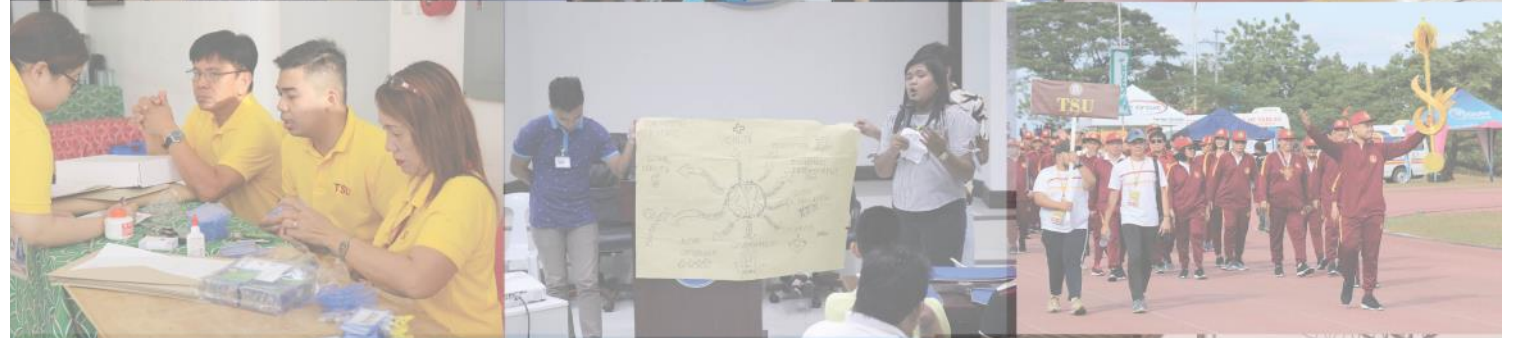
