The town of Pura experienced a season full of innovation, creativity, and generosity, thanks to a series of events organized by the College of Business and Accountancy (CBA). These activities, which highlighted the skills and resilience of senior citizens while spreading joy and hope to the younger generation, were made possible through the leadership and collaboration of CBA's various departments, student organizations, and the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Pura.

The first event, "Product Development: Training and Return Demonstration on Using Black Rice as a Substitute for Coffee Beans," took place on November 20. Organized by the CBA's Entrepreneurship Department and the Office of the Senior Citizens Affairs (OSCA) of Pura, the workshop aimed to teach senior citizens how to create a healthier coffee substitute using the region's abundant black rice. Faculty expert Dr. Elvira B. Mercado, with the assistance of facilitator Ms. Angie M. Bengco and student volunteers from the YES Organization—Casper Asuncion, Carlos Teofilo, and Mark Jay Briones—guided the participants through the process of cleaning, roasting, and straining the rice, allowing them to experiment with various rice varieties and create their own flavor profiles.

On December 3, the CBA's Hospitality and Tourism Management (HTM) Department provided a workshop titled "Expanding Product Options: Training and Return Demonstration in Creating Malunggay Bread Using Pure Malunggay Powder." This workshop focused on baking malunggay (moringa) doughnuts and squash bread.

Under the leadership of Mr. Feliciano Lambus, President of OSCA, and Ms. Emmery P. Balbas, the senior citizens were guided through the process of preparing malunggay puree and steaming squash. Mr. John Edward S. Estayo provided hands-on assistance, helping the participants master key baking techniques, such as ingredient measurement, dough weighing for cost



In a bid to strengthen community health Ipreparedness, the College of Science's (COS) Nursing Department conducted a training program on Basic Life Support and Standard First Aid for Barangay Health Workers (BHWs) in Barangay Comillas, La Paz, Tarlac. Held on November 22, the program aimed to equip the participants with the necessary skills and confidence to effectively address medical emergencies, thereby enhancing the overall safety of the community.

The training consisted of two core components designed to address a wide range of emergency situations. The first component,

focused on first aid for emergency handling, was led by resource speaker Ms. Jorlyn J. Cleofas and facilitated by Mr. Joey Albert D. David, Mr. Peejay B. Pineda, Ms. Jennifer C. Valenzuela, and Ms. Angeline D. Martinez. They provided practical techniques and exercises for managing emergencies such as choking, burns, fractures, and bleeding. In the Basic Life Support session, Mr.

Wilson S. Lanario served as the resource speaker, supported by technical facilitators Ms. Flora M. Tel-Equen, Ms. Carol-Jane N. David, and Ms. Rowena L. Lamorena. They were joined by Ms. Rhea Carla S. Diaz and Dr. Mary Jane N. Rigor.

This session emphasized life-saving interventions, including Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), rescue breathing, and the management of cardiac arrest and choking cases. Participants had the opportunity to practice these techniques using manikins and simulated scenarios, gaining hands-on experience and a deeper understanding of lifesaving measures.

This initiative has significantly enhanced the capabilities of BHWs, enabling them to act swiftly and effectively during emergencies. With programs like this, the goal of fostering a well-prepared and health-conscious community becomes more achievable, ensuring that prompt and effective care is available when it is needed most.

While they were there, Ms. Madriaga and Prof. Augusto Lulu Jr. finalized the voiceover script, ensuring it was accurate and respectful. The script was reviewed by Dr. Francelle L. Calub and the elders of the Aeta Mag-Antsi tribe to make sure it reflected their true voice and cultural values.

From November 4 to November 26, Ms. Pablo and Mr. Bognot guided the students in editing the photos and videos they had collected. On November 7, the team worked with the TSU



Firefox Disc Jockeys to record the voiceover, bringing the script to life. By November 27, the first draft of the multimedia materials was shared with the project's stakeholders for feedback.

The team spent the next few days, from November 28 to December 3, revising the materials based on the feedback they received. They worked hard to ensure the final product was accurate, engaging, and respectful of the Aeta Mag-Antsi's culture.

On December 4, the final multimedia materials were presented to the Project Leader of Project Aytalakad Ing Lahi for distribution. These materials will help promote cultural awareness and preserve the Aeta Mag-Antsi's heritage

# **CIT CONDUCTS TECHNICAL ASSESSMENT AND RESTORATION OF DEHYDRATOR FOR OSCA PURA**

 $F_{Industrial\ Technology\ (CIT)\ of\ Tarlac\ State}$ University (TSU) successfully completed a two-phase extension initiative to support the livelihood program of the Office of the Senior Citizens Association (OSCA) in Pura.

The first phase, conducted on November 4 and 16, focused on assessing the condition of a malfunctioning dehydrator vital to the association's operations. The second phase, held on December 18 and 19, involved the restoration of the machine.

Led by Mr. Sixto C. Ordonia, Mr. JL Christian T. Mangrobang, Mr. Dennis Michael C. Gutierrez, and Mr. Alfredo P. Ibanez, the initiative began with a thorough evaluation of the dehydrator. The team disassembled its components to inspect for mechanical issues, paying close attention to the timer's accuracy by recording its cut-in and cut-off intervals. They identified discrepancies that could affect the dehydrator's performance and presented a detailed action plan to OSCA representatives, outlining the necessary repairs.

The second phase focused on restoring the dehydrator's functionality. The team cleaned the machine, removed debris, and inspected its components for any damage.



The Senior High Department of Victoria ▲ National High School (VNHS), established in 2016 in response to the Department of Education's K to 12 curriculum implementations, has consistently produced quality graduates. On December 5, faculty members of the College of Industrial Technology (CIT) of Tarlac State University (TSU) conducted a Technical Needs Assessment at Golden Crown Petals & Herbs (GCHP), in Barangay Maliwalo, Tarlac City. The assessment aimed to design and fabricate a Manual Gum Paste Cutter with the primary goals of enhancing production efficiency, securing a major client contract, and generating long-term employment opportunities for local workers. This initiative supports the company's vision for sustainable growth and community development.

The assessment team, led by Engr. Larry A. Suboc, and faculty experts Mr. Ray Vincent T. Sarabia, Mr. Van Ian D. Madriaga, and Mr. Dennis Michael C. Gutierrez, conducted a thorough inspection of key production areas.



operational data, such as production volume per worker per day and total workforce, which currently consists of 35 employees. The company's product range includes big dots, small dots, big stars, and small stars.

Interviews and consultations were conducted with CEO Ms. Fe Esperanza M. Aquino, Marketing Manager Ms. Alma Solidum, production managers, and operators to understand their challenges and gather input on the desired features for the manual gum paste cutter. The team also performed a Design and Functionality Assessment to ensure the cutter would integrate into existing workflows while remaining adaptable for future production needs. Additionally, a Cost and Resource Assessment was carried out to estimate budget requirements, material costs, and labor needs, ensuring the project's feasibility.

The data and insights gathered during the assessment will guide the development of a customized manual gum paste cutter, helping GCPH achieve operational excellence and contribute positively to the local economy.
